
## Mean What You Sing

**Purpose:** This exercise helps explore how changing word emphasis can shift meaning and emotion in a phrase. It encourages vocal flexibility, stronger lyric connection, and musical expression.

**Summary:** The phrase "I never said he stole my heart" is sung multiple times, with a different word emphasized each time. This exercise explores how musical choices—like making one word louder, higher, longer, or more expressive—can change the message. It allows space to experiment with storytelling. Facial expression and body language grow alongside vocal delivery, making the phrase more engaging and emotionally connected each time it's sung.

**Extension:** Sing the same rhythm again, but on a single note.
